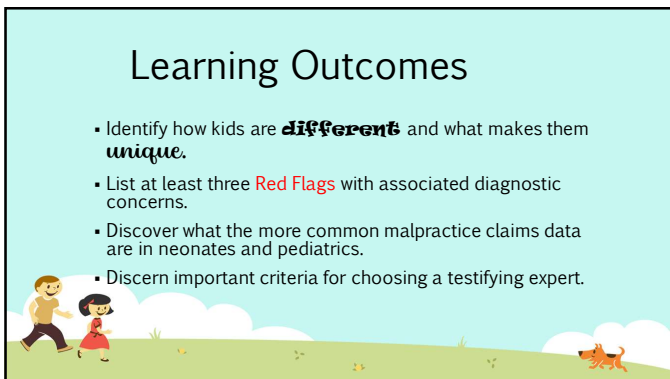

How are kids **different**?

- Big heads, fontanels and soft bones
- Narrow airways
- Temperature regulation is poor
- Poor coordination
- Small veins and lots of sub-q fat
- Immature reasoning skills
- Rely on others for safety and communication

What makes them **unique**?

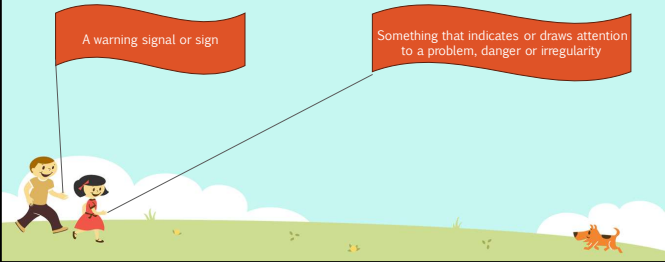
...or persnickety little boogers!

Red Flags



A warning signal or sign


Something that indicates or draws attention to a problem, danger or irregularity

Neuro


- Lethargy, unable to awaken
- Irritability, meningismus
- Bulging fontanel, change in head circumference
- Seizures
- Gait disturbance
- Change in developmental milestones

Cardiac

- Hypotension/Hypertension
- Large heart on Xray
- Tachycardia/Bradycardia
- Capillary refill
- Tripod/squat position
- Mottled

Pulmonary

- Work of breathing, chest pain, wheezing, cough
- Tachypnea/apnea/belly breathing
- Nasal flaring and intercostal retractions
- Drooling
- Head bobbing
- Unable to talk, eat, play or ...play video games, hang with friends, sports
- Tachycardia at rest

Gastrointestinal


- Abdominal distention
- Abdominal pain
- Diarrhea
- Vomiting
- Refusing to eat
- Refusing to poop/cant poop
- Signs of blood in stool or emesis

Musculoskeletal

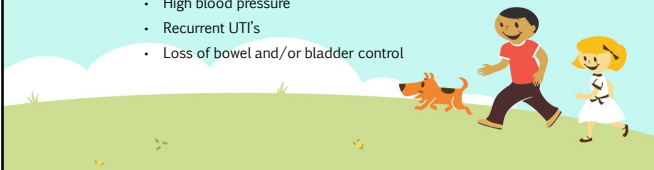
- Not using an extremity
- Hot or pain to touch
- Will not walk or crawl
- Tilt of the head to one side/looking one direction

Kidneys


- Foul smelling urine, blood in urine
- No wet diapers
- Can't pee/won't pee
- High blood pressure
- Recurrent UTI's
- Loss of bowel and/or bladder control

Other Organs/Systems


- Enlarged Liver/Jaundice
- Sudden and severe pain on one side of testicle/high riding
- Rash, blistering, swelling, bites, open areas
- Fever/hypothermia
- Swollen lymph nodes
- Combination of more than one flag

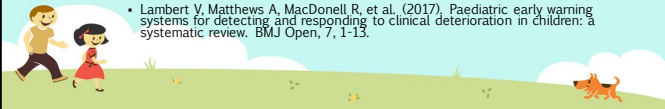
